Domestic Violence Awareness & Prevention

The Temecula Valley Woman's Club (TVWC) was founded in 1980. In the year 2020, our 40th year as a vibrant and impactful nonprofit in the Temecula Valley and one of the largest Woman's Clubs in California, we were met with challenges in the way we operated due to the COVID-19 pandemic. We met these challenges and overcame them, conducting our committee meetings online with Zoom and tailoring our community efforts to comply with social distancing guidelines.

The pandemic affected our traditional projects because of the need for social distancing, but where we could we followed through on our donations even if we couldn't be there to present them in person.

And unrelated to the Pandemic, we added new efforts when we recognized immediate needs in the community - a donation of clothing to the Rape Crisis Center

Project Title: Clothing for Riverside Area Rape Crisis Center Hours: 18 Donated: \$352 In-Kind: \$0

The Riverside Area Rape Crisis Center provides support and services to survivors of sexual assault and their families. In February, the Committee learned of their need for replacement clothing for clients who undergo medical exams at the center after reporting a sexual assault. Two of the committee's members immediately purchased 40 t-shirts, 40 leggings and several pair of flip-flops and delivered them to the center.

Project Title: Mother's Day Gifts to SAFE Family Justice Center Hours: 27 Donated: \$0 In-Kind: \$600

SAFE (Safe Alternatives for Everyone) provides services for children, youth and families who have experienced or are at risk of abuse and violence. In May, when it came to the attention of the Committee that the SAFE Family Justice Center was collecting items for Mother's Day to distribute to local women and children who are victims of domestic violence and being assisted by SAFE, we put out a call to our TVWC members for in-kind donations of self-pampering items like body lotion, shampoo and makeup for the women and games for the children. We collected over \$600 worth of gifts to bring some joy to those families.

Project Title: Boys and Girls of Prisoners Foundation at Calicinto Ranch Hours: 29 Donated: \$400 In-Kind: \$0

The Boys and Girls Foundation at Calicinto Ranch is a family-run nonprofit in San Jacinto founded in the 1980's that has helped thousands of at-risk kids of incarcerated parents to break the cycle of incarceration. Each year we help this organization to provide Christmas gifts to the children who are a part of this program. It seemed especially important to continue the effort this year with Covid-19 interrupting many holiday plans. Exercising safety protocols, three members of the Committee went shopping for eight children following Christmas lists provided. Three members also went to the Ranch to help wrap some of the 100's of gifts donated from ours and other organizations.

Project Title: Pinwheels for Prevention and Awareness Hours: 8 Donated: \$0 In-Kind: \$50

This year the Committee partnered with Catholic Families for Charity and the HOPE Collaborative to make pinwheels and display them in front yards, around schools and near the nonprofit SAFE (Safe Alternatives for Everyone). This year we also displayed blue ribbons as part of a project for the HOPE Collaborative, helping to promote the safety of children and prevent abuse and neglect in Riverside County.

Project Title: Alabaster Jar Hours: 10 Donated: \$0 In-Kind: \$41

The Alabaster Jar Project provides a resource center, safe housing and job skill training for victims of human trafficking in San Diego. The young women involved in this program use donated jewelry to repurpose into new creations to sell for income. Members of the Committee sorted through old or broken items to donate to this cause
